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Administrative Regulation for Administration of Medications at School

- 1. Any prescription or non- prescription (over the counter medication) must be accompanied by a completed **Weimar ISD Medication Administration Request Form** and turned in to the school nurse.
- 2. Medications are considered any pills, liquids, inhalers, sprays, eye drops, ear drops, cough drops or topically applied creams or ointments that are expected to relieve symptoms.
- 3. Only medications that are medically necessary during the school hours for the student's attendance or written in an IEP/IHP should be sent to school. Medication prescribed or requested to be given three (3) times a day or less are not to be given at school unless a physician prescribes a specific time during school hours.
- 4. For the student safety, all medication (s) should be brought to the Health/Front Office by a parent/guardian. Elementary school students may not carry medication home (with the exception of inhalers); all medication must be transferred from adult to adult. Junior High and High School student's may carry home medication, other than controlled substance, with prior authorization by the parent/guardian.
- 5. The first dose of any medication for the current condition/illness may not be given at school.
- 6. Written permission form parents and physician is required for students to carry a self-administer medications. Only insulin, asthma reliever inhalers or emergency epinephrine, will be allowed as self-carry medications. All other medications must be administered by the school nurse or authorized district staff.
- 7. Intramuscular injections (IM) will only be administered in life-threatening situations per physician emergency action plans. Intravenous (IV) medications will not be given.
- 8. All prescription medication must be in the original pharmacy container or packaging and labeled by the pharmacist or physician. The label must include the following:
 - Student's name
 - Name of the prescribing physician who is licensed in Texas.
 - Name of medication with strength.
 - Dosage and directions.
 - Date prescription was filled (must be in current bottle or packaging).

- 9. The parent/guardian will be responsible for bringing the routine medication to school. No more than a month's supply of medication will be stored on school property. Parents or guardians are required to bring in each month's supply on a mutually agreed upon date; either the 1st or 15th of each month, which allows the school nurse to discuss the student's condition and plan of care with the parent or guardian on a regular basis.
- 10. Non-prescription (over-the-counter) medication will be given if all of the following requirements are met:
 - Medication must be supplied by the parent/guardian.
 - Medication must be approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and appear in the United States Pharmacopeia.
 - Medications must be in the original, properly labeled container and labeled for dosage appropriate to the student's age and/or weight.
 - Only medications that cannot be given at home will be given at school.
 - Non-prescription medications may be available in the Health/Front Office for two (2) weeks only with parent/guardian authorization. After two (2) weeks, a physician's order will be required for the medication to remain at school.
 - Non-prescription medication may not be given more than three (3) consecutive school days without a physician's order to do so.
- 11. School district personnel will not dispense natural and/or homeopathic-like products not FDA approved.
- 12. Expired medications will not be given.
- 13. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian for retrieving the medication from the Health/Front Office when it is no longer needed or when the school year ends. Parent/guardian's for Junior High and High School student's may authorize on the Weimar ISD Administration of Medication Request Form if excess and/or unused medication, other than controlled substances, can be sent home with the student when it is no longer needed or when the school year ends.
- 14. In accordance with the Nurse Practice Act, Texas Code Section 217.11, the school nurse has the responsibility and authority to clarify a medication order with appropriate licensed practitioner and/or refuse to administer medication that, in the nurse's judgment, is not in the best interest on the student.
